ELEVATIONS BUILDING 6 **A9**

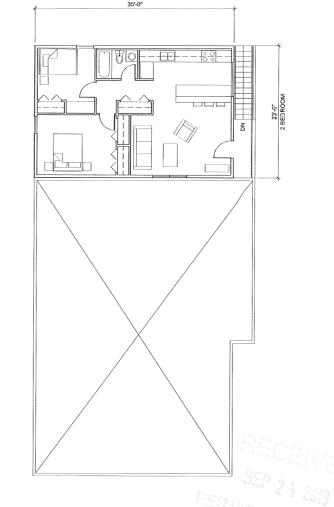


FLOOR PLAN LOWER LEVEL (BUILDING 6)

1.0 EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Juneau Volunteers of America, LLC (JVOA) is proposing a housing development on Douglas Island off Vista Drive, immediately north of Lawson Creek. The property is currently owned by JLC Properties, Inc., who is working in coordination with JVOA. The project involves two Phases. DOWL HKM is completing the civil design with assistance from R&M Engineering for the Engineering Geological Report, Morris Engineering Group for street lighting, and Lumen design+build, llc (and subconsultants) for the architectural, structural, electrical, and mechanical disciplines. It is understood that a Hillside Endorsement is required for this project in support of the Conditional Use approval process. The purpose of the endorsement is to show how erosion and drainage control are being implemented, that waterways are protected from sedimentation and pollution, that the development is being designed to minimize injury or damage to people or property, and that adverse aesthetic impacts are minimized. The following items summarize the key features of this project:

- Two Conditional Use permits are being applied for, one for each phase of development;
- Phase I includes Vista Drive, Buildings 1-4, the Community Center, and the driveway and a portion of the adjacent parking lot to serve the Community Center;
- Phase 2 includes Buildings 5-8 and associated driveways and parking lots;
- Phase 1 Construction is scheduled to begin in Spring 2014;
- 75 Total Dwelling Units: 40 in Phase I and 35 in Phase II;
- The footprint has been minimized to protect natural vegetation and aesthetic concerns;
- Retaining walls have been minimized;
- Fill slopes 2:1 or flatter have been maintained;
- A Wetlands permit has been obtained;
- The unnamed drainage through the site is not listed as an anadromous fish stream so a habit permit has not been obtained;

This application will address the above items and more in greater detail. The following Sections are arranged in accordance with the Submission Requirements outlined in CBJ Ordinance 49.70.240. For the maps and drawings requested, a Hillside Endorsement Permit Drawing Set is included for reference in Appendix A.

2.0 SUBMISSION REQUIREMENTS

2.1 Vicinity Map

A vicinity map is included on the cover page of the Drawings (Sheet G1.0).

2.2 Site Maps – Present Condition

Existing contours, drainage ways, lot boundaries, easements, and improvements on the site and adjacent properties are shown on the Existing Site Conditions drawing (Sheet C3.0) and on the Plan & Profile and Site Grading sheets where applicable (Sheets C4.0 - C5.2).

2.3 Site Plan – Proposed Finished Improvements

Drawings showing the proposed finished development improvements and extent of work are included in the permit set as follows:

- Finished Site Plan (Sheet C3.1) This drawing provides an overview of the improvements for the entire site showing roadway, driveways, buildings, parking, utilities, drainage, storm water treatment facilities, retaining walls, clearing limits, and final site topography (2 foot contours). Lot boundaries and proposed easements are shown. Drainage is shown to the existing culvert crossing Douglas Highway.
- Site Sections (Sheets C7.0 C7.1) Four cross sections of the development site are included. The locations of the sections are shown on the Finished Site Plan (C3.1).

2.4 Detailed Engineering Drawings

The following detailed engineering plans are included in the permit set:

- Typical Sections (Sheet C1.0) Three typical sections are included: Vista Drive, Parking Lot (Phase 1 specifically depicted), and the Driveway (to Phase 2). The typical section for Vista Drive is a modification from the CBJ Standard Details and is discussed in further detail in Section 3.1 Roads.
- Details (Sheet C2.0) Details of key features related to the Hillside Endorsement are included, such as Energy Dissipation Pad, Discharge Channel Section, Structural Improvements for Foundations (per the Geological Report), and others as deemed pertinent.
- Vista Drive Plan & Profile (Sheet C4.0) The plan and profile for Vista Drive is depicted from its connection to the existing Vista Drive road grade to the top of the hill for this project. All ROW improvements are depicted including roadway, curbing, sidewalk, ditching, storm drainage, utilities, cut and fill slopes, and clearing limits. Final ground contours are shown as background to better correlate development improvements.
- Site Grading Plans (Sheets C5.0-C5.2) Site grading plans are provided for each building / driveway / parking area combination. General grading, flow arrows, and finished elevations are included. Curbing, sidewalk, slope limits, clearing limits, and retaining walls are shown. No off-site stormwater runoff improvements are included. The on-site runoff is routed through stormwater treatment facilities that detain the runoff and then discharges into an existing stabilized drainage. Off site (from higher elevation) runoff is passed through the site, through an energy dissipation pad, and into an existing

36" CMP culvert under Douglas Highway. The capacity of the culvert is discussed further in Section 3.4.1 – Off-Site Hydrology.

• Vista Drive Cross Sections (Sheets C6.0-6.2) – Cross sections for Vista Drive are included every 20 feet.

2.5 Off-Site Fill and Excess Fill Considerations

2.5.1 Off-Site Fill

The only off-site fill will be shot rock, 2" crushed stone, and D-1 base course as required for the typical sections (see Sheet C1.0). This will be obtained from existing permitted material sources in Juneau.

2.5.2 Excess Fill

Site soils consist of overburden, sands, gravels, silts, and rock (see the Engineering Geologic Report by R&M Engineering, Inc.). All excavated soils will be disposed of on-site as shown on the Finished Site Plan (C3.1) and Development Site Cross Sections (Sheets C7.0-7.1).

2.6 Landscaping Plan

This drawing depicts natural vegetation to be retained and areas of new vegetative plantings for stabilizing cut and fill slopes, as well as to beautify the development. At present, this drawing focuses on the areas that will be re-planted and the types of plants, trees, and shrubs to be used.

2.7 Engineering Geologic Report

R&M Engineering, Inc., completed an Engineering Geologic Report in 1995 - 1996. This included logging and sampling 13 test pits and summarizing the results in a letter and two drawings. The test pit locations were limited by topography as a ravine through the property is not passable without extensive earthwork. To supplement that work for this project, R&M Engineering walked the site and performed hand auger test holes. A supplemental Engineering Geologic Report was prepared from this investigation. Both the 1997 and current results are included as Appendix B.

2.8 Work Schedule

The project is divided into two Phases. Phase 1 includes the extension of Vista Drive as a CBJ Standard Street, the development of four (4) multi-unit buildings with associated parking and storm water treatment, plus a Community Building which is centered between Phase I and Phase II. Phase I therefore includes construction of a portion of the driveway to Phase 2 (see the Finished Site Plan, Sheet C3.0) and at least a portion of the first parking lot for Phase 2. Phase 1 will also include rough grading and development of engineered fill embankments for Phase 2 buildings. This will allow approximately one year for additional soil consolidation where Phase 2 buildings will be placed on fill. These areas will be graded to control runoff and stabilized with vegetation and wood chips.

3.0 STANDARDS FOR APPROVAL

3.1 Roads

A modification to the CBJ Standard Detail for the roadway typical section is proposed in accordance with 49.70.250(1) (A) and (B). The proposed modification provides the CBJ standard sidewalk on the right side of the roadway. This is consistent with the existing typical section for Vista Drive, which has a 4 foot wide asphalt sidewalk, and reduces the earthwork as described below in 3.1.2.

3.1.1 <u>Traffic Analysis</u>

Kittleson & Associates completed an assessment of the requirements for a Traffic Impact Analysis for the site. A copy of the assessment is included in Appendix C. The assessment gives trip generations that classify the extension of Vista Drive at less than Collector Street levels.

3.1.2 Meet Criteria of 49.70.260

Providing a sidewalk on the development side of the street reduces the earthwork impact by allowing Vista Drive to be closer to the Lawson Creek drainage without sacrificing safety. The hillside slope down to the creek is steep and the development has sought to maintain a safety buffer for vehicles, as well as direct pedestrians to the development side of the street. A sidewalk on the Lawson Creek side would encourage pedestrians near Lawson Creek and push the roadway and the buildings closer to the first on-site ravine. The developer is seeking to minimize placement of building foundation on fill which will provide for a more stable hillside.

3.1.3 Cul-de-sac or Secondary Access

This project proposes to terminate Vista Drive in a hammer head configuration that complies with the Fire Apparatus Access Roads, Section D103.4 Dead Ends standard. A full CBJ Standard cul-de-sac would result in greater excavation and put the edge of the cul-de-sac very near to the Lawson Creek hillside. The hammer head configuration facilitates vehicle turnaround while minimizing hillside cut.

3.1.4 Road Width

The development proposes to maintain the standard CBJ Street width, and to provide a single five-foot pedestrian way (sidewalk). We are proposing this for the entire extension of Vista Drive for the following reasons:

- The existing Vista Drive typical section includes a four-foot sidewalk on only the uphill (right) side. The proposed typical section matches this, while also improving to a five-foot sidewalk.
- All pedestrians from the development will be originating from or traveling to housing on the right side of Vista Drive. This is an improvement over the existing condominiums arrangement, which requires pedestrians to cross Vista Drive to access the sidewalk.
- Snow storage can be provided along the left side of the street in the relatively flat area between the curb and hillside.

There are driveway entrances along the stretch, but they are not compromised by this modification because the roadway width and grade meet CBJ standards.

3.1.5 Road Grade

No modification is proposed.

3.2 Weather

The developer will coordinate their work schedule with predominant weather conditions and CBJ requirements.

5.2 Winter Maintenance & Snow Storage

The extension of Vista Drive will be a CBJ Street. Maintenance will be by CBJ Public Works. The housing will have a manager who will manage maintenance and snow removal. Areas for snow storage are indicated on the Finished Site Plan (C3.1).

5.3 Lighting

Street lighting will be in accordance with CBJ standard street lights, or better. Standard glare cutoff shields will be used. Building lighting is being submitted as part of the Conditional Use permit application, which will address glare and related issues.

5.4 Common Areas

A Community Building and Playground are proposed for the project and are shown on the Final Site Plan and the Engineering Drawings. Both are located near the top of the development between Phase 1 and Phase 2. They are expected to be shielded by Building 1 from the condominiums view plane up the hill. Due to the elevation difference (the playground is over 30 feet higher than the existing condominiums), sound is expected to be minimal.

5.5 Other Permits

A USACE Wetlands permit has already been obtained for the project area based on the previous project footprint, which is larger than this site. A copy of this permit is included for reference.

This letter summarizes modifications or additions we are making to the Hillside Endorsement application package submitted on August 30, 2013. These changes are being made to better address or clarify items in the application package. We are referencing specific sections of the application with direction on supplementing the existing information or replacing it in its entirety.

Please make the following amendments to the Hillside Endorsement application package:

1. Project Narrative, Section 2.6 Landscaping Plan. ADD the following:

The landscape design for the JVOA- Juneau I Housing has been prepared in accordance with 04 CBJAC 060 Landscape Requirements, as modified to best suit the site. The project site abuts properties zoned D-5 on the south side of the site, D-18 on the northwest side of the site, D-18 on the southeast side of the site (or Urban Street depending on interpretation). Based on Table 1 and Table 2, the site requires 5-foot landscape buffering on the northwest side of the site and the south east side of the site. Much of the required buffering on the northwest side of the site will be met with existing natural vegetation. During construction, the natural vegetation area to remain will be fenced off with temporary construction fencing for protection and to ensure that care is taken to maintain this vegetation. For other areas with perimeter landscape requirements, we have included landscape quantities to match the ordinance requirements. It is not reasonably possible to plant the quantity of landscape materials (two rows of trees at 15 feet on center, five feet apart) in a 5-foot wide buffer. As can be seen on Sheet L1.1, we have dispersed those plantings to visually enhance the proposed new buildings. It should be noted that screening on this side of the development is achieved by the mature vegetation that exists on either side of Lawson Creek, which will not be disturbed.

Interior Landscape has been developed to accent and complement the buildings. Larger trees are placed in groupings near corners of buildings and in smaller groupings away from buildings. Shrubs and perennial plantings are used for building accents near entries and focal points where the scale is appropriate. Plant materials have been selected to provide color, texture and form throughout the year.

Due to the slope of the site, tree plantings are located nearer the buildings. On the steeper fill slopes of the site, we are proposing a native grass mix or a mix of native grasses and wildflowers to stabilize the slope and to provide seasonal interest until other native vegetation volunteers on those slopes.

As authorized by DOWL HKM, a notice to proceed was issued on August 7, 2013, R&M Engineering, Inc. (R&M) conducted a field reconnaissance on the proposed Juneau Housing I-Lawson Creek project on August 21, 2013. The field reconnaissance was accomplished by conducting a study of the general features of the site, identifying ground features of engineering significance, i.e., slope conditions, drainage and streams, presence of bedrock; and by random soil probing to determine thickness of soft or unsuitable soil layer. The field work was performed in reference to the preliminary site plan and building cross sections furnished to R&M by Gary Jenkins, P.E., DOWL HKM on August 20, 2013.

Introduction

The agreed scope of work for this project included reviewing the 1995 R&M geologic assessment information in conjunction with our geotechnical engineer walking the subject property to visually observe any bedrock outcroppings and perform random hand auger probes on the north side of the main drainage channel. A letter report would be prepared that describes site preparation recommendations for constructing two story buildings grouped as shown in the concept plan, brief geologic description of the site, groundwater control suggestions, frost penetration depth, weather sensitivity issues, allowable soil bearing pressures, suitability of existing soils for reuse on the project and site drainage recommendations.

The geological assessment letter by R&M for the Gastineau Vista Park Development in October 12, 1995, is cited and referenced in generating this geotechnical letter report. A total of 13 machine dug test pits were completed in 1995. Some of the test pits fall within the proposed Juneau Housing I — Lawson Creek buildings. See the attached Test Pits and Soil Probing Location Map. Selected photos taken during the field reconnaissance and selected photos of the 1995 machine dug test pits were included in this report to depict the general soil and site conditions of the project. The recommendations presented in this letter report may be used for the preliminary design of the project. For report purposes Gastineau Channel is considered east.

Site Description

The project site is located on Douglas Island on a moderately sloping upland bounded by steep stream valleys on each side. Unnamed Creek is located on the north side and Lawson Creek on its south side. According to the R&M 1995 Geological Assessment Report, the project site was formed by glacial till, deposited by the glacier that carved the Gastineau Channel Fiord. The terrain is generally sloping towards Douglas Highway (east side). The site is covered by sparse to dense Spruce Hemlock forest with Blueberry and devils club underbrush. Second growth Alder trees were noted at the northeast portion of the site.

Subsurface Conditions

Based on the machine dug test pits in 1995, the subsurface conditions at the project site consists of peat and organic material and/or organic rich soil cover from 0.5 to 4.0 feet thick. The south side represented by TP-9, TP-10, TP-11, TP-12 & TP-13, underlying the organic mat and/or organic soil, is the well drained, coarse and angular sand and gravel deposits persisted to 12 to 18 feet depth between test pits location. The sand and gravel deposits are probable mountain stream fan deposits laid down as the glacier receded. Underlying the organic mat and/or organic soil on TH-7 and TH-8 is the stiff blue gray poorly sorted silty sandy gravel with cobbles (glacial till) persistent to 15 to 18 feet in depth between the two test pits.



Figure 1: 1995 TP-3 showing a bluish gray glacial till common beneath all 1995 test pits.

Hand soil probes at the south side, P-1, P-2, & P-3, revealed soft and unsuitable soil thickness from 1.5 to 6 feet below the surface. The rest of the soil probes revealed that thickness of soft and unsuitable soil varies from 1 to 3 feet. Underlying the soft and unsuitable soil is either the stiff glacial till or medium dense sand layer where the soil probe refused to penetrate.

In the north stream valley (unnamed creek), coarse gravel to boulders are scattered and deposited upstream and downstream of the creek. The coarse gravel to boulders materials are generally sub-rounded to angular and likely eroded from the glacial till formation described in the test pits. In elevated areas at the sides of the creek, the coarse gravel to boulder materials are covered with 0.5 to 2 feet thick of silty sand sediments. Soil probing depths were limited to 1 to 2 feet depth because of the large size materials. No bedrock outcrops were visually observed during the site reconnaissance visit.

Drainage and Slope Conditions

Water seepage and runoffs were noted discharging towards the steep stream valleys on each side of the site. The creek water level of unnamed creek varied from 6" deep to less than 12".

In the 1995 test pits, ground water level was observed where the surface of the glacial till layer was encountered. It is likely the observed ground water levels are perched or trapped water over the impermeable glacial till layer.

Slope erosions were mostly noted on the north stream valley. By visual inspection, the slope erosions were mainly of shallow failure type, emanating from the upper loose or soft layer and exited on the firm

glacial till. The eroded materials were mostly sand and gravel mixed with gray silt. Several trees were observed uprooted at the steep side slope of the north stream valley and fell over the creek.

RECOMMENDATIONS

Soil Bearing Capacity & Settlement

Site cross section A-A provided by DOWL HKM indicates building and parking structure excavation depths from 20-30 feet below original ground. The 1995 test pit depths were a maximum of 18 feet. Where the site excavation for the building/parking foundation is in the 20-foot depth, the indicated footings are likely to bear on the stiff glacial till material. As described in the R&M's October 12, 1995 Geologic Assessment Report for the Gastineau Vista Park Development, the glacial till is generally stable when undisturbed and not saturated. In those areas where excavation depth is greater than 20 feet, the glacial till formations could become very dense requiring a pneumatic impact breaker and/or bedrock could be present. Additional borehole exploration program is recommended on this site since the planned excavation cut depths are well below the depths of the test pits. The boreholes will verify the soil conditions below the deep cuts for building/parking foundations and supplement this letter report.

For preliminary design and analysis of the building footings, a maximum allowable soil bearing of 2.0 kips/ft² (2,000 psf) may be assumed for spread and continuous footings designed and constructed on the stiff glacial till layer. Settlement for the recommended soil bearing capacity is practically negligible. In designing the foundation to resist lateral loads, an allowable passive resistance (SF=2) of 200 lb/ft2 per foot of depth and a coefficient of friction equal to 0.35 may be utilized for footings embedment into the stiff glacial till.

RECEIVED SP2428 For the analysis of earthquake loading, the above values of allowable bearing pressure and passive resistance may be increased by a factor of one-third. This material is not expected to be weakened by the earthquake-induced ground motion.

Seismic Zone and Site Class

The Latest International Building Code (IBC 2009) uses a recurrence level of 2% chance of exceedance in 50 years (a 2,500 year recurrence interval) as a basis for design. For a recurrence level of 2% in 50 years, the following seismic accelerations were derived from USGS probabilistic seismic hazard (AK 1999).

Peak Ground Acceleration (PGA) = 0.246gSpectral Response: $0.2 \text{ Sec } (S_s) = 56.04\%$ $1.0 \text{ Sec } (S_1) = 26.77\%$

The spectral response was derived based on Latitude = 58.3 and Longitude = -134.4. The IBC 2009 soil classification for the site based on the limited geotechnical data, in our opinion, may be taken as Class D.

Lateral Earth Pressure

In general, lateral loads can be resisted through frictional resistance to sliding along the base of the foundation and the sides of the foundation walls (if any), and through passive resistance against the foundation. Both earth pressure coefficients at rest K_0 (to be applied for stiff structures at rest, non-yielding) and active earth pressure coefficients Ka (to be applied for cantilever retaining walls, yielding) are derived from the frictional angles of the actual applied backfill materials, assumed roughness and inclination of surface of backfill. For stiff constructions at rest, the degree of compaction applied will affect the earth pressure on the structure. Over-compaction of any backfill behind the wall should be prevented, especially on walls design for at-rest lateral pressure.

The following active and at-rest lateral earth pressures coefficient may be used in designing yielding and non-yielding walls.

*-The NAVFAC DM.7-2 suggest that the earth pressure coefficient for dynamic increase in lateral force can be approximated as $\frac{3}{4}$ of the horizontal acceleration. The dynamic lateral force is assumed to act at 0.6H above the wall base.

Dewatering

Based on the 1995 machine dug test pits, the ground water level appeared to be perched water table. Controlling ground water during excavation will require implementation of vertical sumps with submersible pumps to dewater the site. On days with high precipitation from rain additional sumps and pumps may be necessary to control the water. Dewatering discharge shall comply with local, state and federal requirements.

Slope Protection/Construction

We understand based on the proposed building cross sections that permanent slope protection is required to support the proposed cut and existing slopes, and footings that are located near the slopes. Based on the soil information of the site, in our opinion, the proposed high cut slopes and the existing slopes may be stabilized or protected by externally stabilized concrete retaining structures (i.e., concrete cantilever wall or MSE wall if space allows).

With the anticipated cut depth of 20 to 30 feet for the proposed building construction, it is assumed that the slope protection or retaining wall will also be founded on the stiff Glacial Till layer. Thus, the soil bearing capacity recommended in Soil Bearing Capacity and Settlement Section and the Coefficient of Lateral Earth Pressures in Table 1 may be used in the design.

Aside from designing the slope protection or retaining walls for the superimposed effect of lateral earth pressure and lateral force due to seismic, it is recommended that the retaining walls be designed assuming the full height of the wall, so that high water seepage and runoffs that may develop unwanted build-up of hydrostatic pressure behind the wall will be taken into consideration. Drainage behind walls should use a NFS free draining, clean gravel or 2" minus shot rock to help relieve any unwanted build-up of hydrostatic pressure.

Based on the subsurface soil layers that we know of at the site, the exposed Glacial Till soils should be covered with visqueen or protected with permanent shot rock slope protection as soon as possible to avoid saturation and potential slope failure. Erosion protection measures such as Coir jute mesh with hydroseed mix or rock slope protection with a blanket of 12" minus well graded shot rock 12" thick should be implemented to protect final surface sloughing or erosion.

The table below shall serve as a guide in the selection of an appropriate temporary cut slope based on soil formation encountered.

It is recommended that the stability of the slope should be monitored especially during and after heavy rainfall events. The above cut slopes are temporary and a flatter or stepped cut slopes should be constructed depending on the actual type of soil material and terrain encountered.

Foundation/Parking Pad Preparation

It is recommended that the foundation/parking pad excavations be kept as dry as possible during construction. If the glacial till foundation soils are allowed to become wet and saturated, it will become soft, shear strength decrease, and compaction of the engineered shot rock fill will become a problem. If the engineered fill is not well compacted the recommended allowable soil bearing pressure will not be valid. After approved erosion control devices installed and the site is cleared/grubbed the existing soft organic soils should be removed and disposed. The sand gravel layer would be excavated and stockpiled on site for future use. Glacial til soils are recommended to be excavated to a depth of 12" below the bottom of the footing and 2" minus compacted shot rock placed. Soft spots encountered will need to be over-excavated and replaced in compacted lifts with 12" minus shot rock.

If additional backfill is required, compacted shot rock borrow may be used to protect the glacial till material from potential swelling and loss of shear strength.

Usable Excavation

In the R&M 1995 Geologic Assessment Report, the sand and gravel deposits at the site were considered as a usable construction material. Sand/gravel materials are moisture sensitive and on site quality testing of this material during construction to determine the optimum moisture density curves is recommended. From our initial geotechnical work we can not confirm the quantity or quality of this material.

Embankment Fill

Review of the concept cross sections provided show a proposed fill area at the north creek side has coarse gravel and boulders exposed in the creek bottom. No soil data was obtained underneath the coarse gravel and boulders at the creek so we have no knowledge if soft or compressible layers exist or not. Assuming the existing subsurface soil conditions are stable, we recommend durable, non-frost susceptible, free draining 12" shot rock borrow to be placed and compacted to a 6' depth above the ground prior to the placement of usable on site

excavated material. Scour protection should be designed to prevent the toe of the embankment from undermining especially during high precipitation events.

The non-frost susceptible (NFS) shot rock borrow should be compacted with a vibratory grid roller (minimum centrifugal force shall be 50,000 lb) with a minimum of 8 passes prior to placement of subsequent lifts or until no more settlement and movement is observed. Lift thickness should not exceed 18-inch depth of 12-inch minus material.

Drainage

During and after construction, it is equally important to grade the site to divert surface water away from the foundation and provide a properly designed drainage system to intercept concentrated runoffs. Engineering measures must be initiated to prevent water inflow into the building foundation excavation and all other areas during construction. The excavation bottom must be kept dry as possible or the glacial till materials may become unmanageable even if it was originally found to be dry. Excessive rain or snow might have a similar effect during construction. The existing drainage channels on the north side of the site where parking lots and building E is planned will require careful sizing of the storm drain pipe with adequate inlet and out headwall control devices to prevent scour and erosion in storm events. Installation of drainage culverts and design of energy dissipater for culverts is necessary to prevent the embankment fill from absorbing high water velocity impacts.

Post construction surface and groundwater problems should not occur as long as:

- 1. All below-grade portions of the building are properly water and moisture-proofed by waterproofing the below grade foundation walls and placement of a plastic vapor barrier below the floor slabs.
- 2. Surface water is effectively isolated from entering all soils below foundation footings and floor slabs.
- 3. Surface grading is accomplished in a manner that will positively divert surface water runoff away from the proposed building.
- 4. Concentrated runoff is controlled by installing perimeter foundation and roof drain systems to route surface and subsurface drainage away from the proposed building.

Frost Protection

The CBJ building department specifies a minimum foundation depth of 32 inches to minimize frost problems; however in some situations, frost has been measured in the CBJ over 4' deep.

Several techniques can be used to alleviate frost problems including burying foundations to depths lower than the frost will penetrate, and designing the building to withstand the frost heaving and jacking forces.

LIMITATIONS

This letter report was prepared to aid DOWL HKM in the design of this specific project. Its scope is limited to the project and location described herein and represents our understanding of the surface and subsurface conditions at the site, at the time of the letter report.



The geotechnical recommendations presented in this geotechnical letter report are developed from the limited information obtained from R&M's 1995 Geologic Assessment Report for the Gastineau Vista Park Development project and the present field reconnaissance survey and random soil probing. Soil conditions may differ from those described in the 1995 tests pits and from the assumed soil layer from random soil probing which may not become evident until during actual construction. Construction monitoring by the geotechnical engineer or a representative is therefore considered necessary to verify the subsurface conditions.

R&M is not responsible for safety programs, methods or procedures of operation, or the construction of the design recommendations provided in this report. Where recommendations are general, or not called out, the recommendations shall conform to standards of the industry. This geotechnical report is for use on this project only and is not intended for reuse without written approval from R&M. This geotechnical report is not to be used in a manner that would constitute a detriment directly, or indirectly, to R&M.

Furthermore, if the project characteristics are altered significantly from those furnished to us and discussed in this report, or if additional information becomes available, a review must be made by R&M office to determine if any modification in the recommendations will be required.

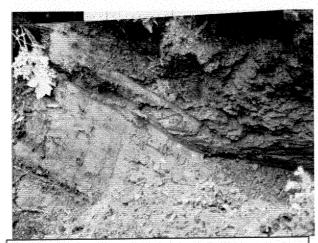

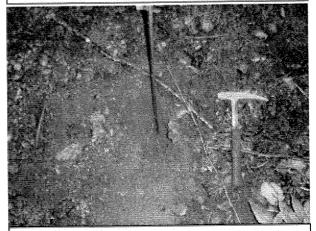

- 26. "JUMPING JACK" OR SIMILAR TYPE COMPACTORS SHALL BE USED TO THOROUGHLY COMPACT ALL LAYERS OF MATERIAL AROUND MATER VALVE BOXES, CATCH BASINS, MANHOLES AND OTHER STRUCTURES.
- ALL CONSTRUCTION SHALL BE PREFORMED IN ACCORDANCE WITH THE ADEC APPROVED STORM WATER POLLUTION PREVENTION PLAN (SWPPP) AND CBJ APPROVED DRAINAGE PERMIT.
- 28. ALL CONSTRUCTION SHALL BE IN ACCORDANCE WITH THE APPLICABLE FEDERAL, STATE AND LOCAL PERWITS REDUIRED FOR THIS PROJECT.

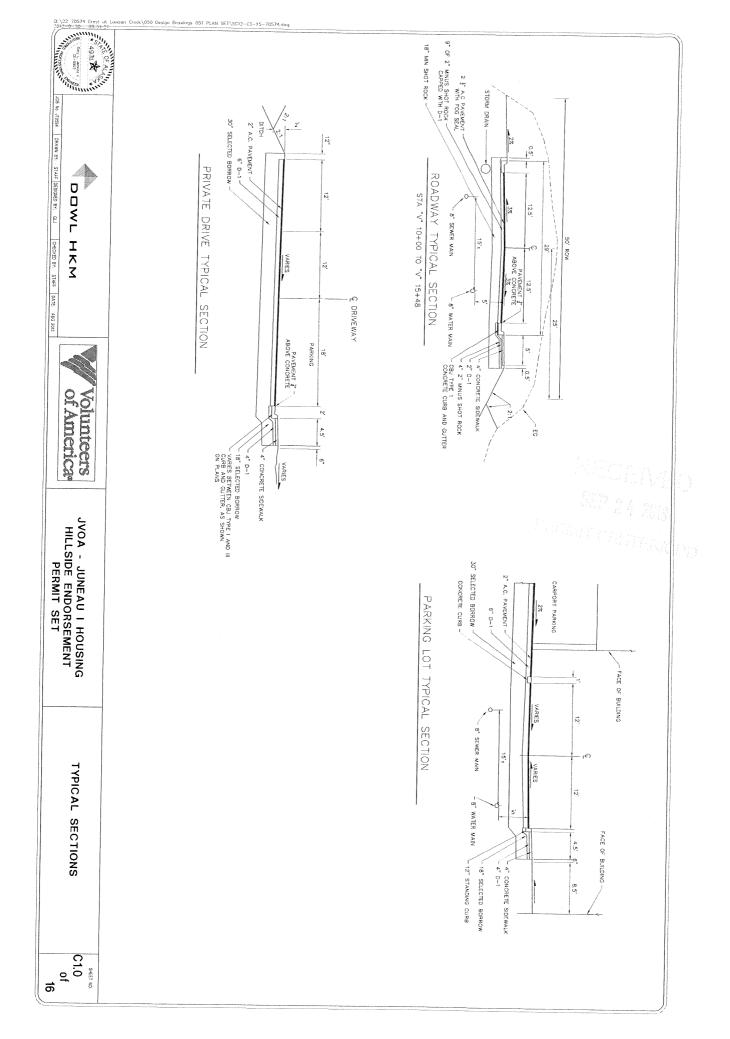
