10	sheds, neighborhood harmony, and create a more prescriptive guide to the industry.
11	NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ENACTED BY THE ASSEMBLY OF THE CITY AND BOROUGH OF
12	JUNEAU, ALASKA:

14	and shall become a part of the City and Borough Code.
